Our Library is a busy place! Mrs. Mamchur, our teacher-librarian, and Mrs. Kuyvenhoven our assistant, welcomed back our students for book exchange and library activities.

Our students in Kindergarten– gr. 3 come each week for 20 minutes, and students in gr. 4—6 come every second week for 20 minutes.

Students will be reintroduced to the pleasures of reading and are given a chance to borrow books to share with their family!

Kindergarten students will be given a special book bag to help keep our books safe and clean. We ask that every student have a water proof bag in order to get books, as if a book is lost or damaged, we ask for a replacement fee.

We hope you will share in their excitement by spending time with them reading and enjoying a good story!

In Central Okanagan Public Schools, no student will be denied participation in an educational program due to financial need. Our Board's Regulation 425R – School Fees (Financial Hardship Clause) ensures families can confidentially request support or alternative arrangements. If cost is a barrier for your child, please contact the school principal.

Safety First: At Watson Road, we hold six fire drills per year: three in the fall and three in the spring. We also hold an earthquake drill and a hold and secure/lockdown drill twice during the year. The earthquake drill provides students with a procedure to follow should they experience an earthquake anywhere, and anytime. We will be practicing with the rest of British Columbian's in the Great British Columbia **Shake Out** Earthquake Drill at **10:16 on October 16th.** For more details, check out the website: www.shakeoutbc.ca On Oct. 7th, we will practice a hold and secure drill—the purpose is to practice a safety procedure to be used in the event that students and staff are required to remain in a safe location during critical situations. Parents and visitors at the school during drills will be included in the practice.

Halloween: On Friday, October 31st students will have an opportunity to have a class photo in the morning, and at 12:20 pm we will have a costume parade outside (weather permitting)!

- Dressing in a costume is optional. Your child may prefer to wear orange and black clothing.
- If your child chooses to wear a costume, please keep in mind that they
 will have to be comfortable for a day of learning at school and playing
 on the playground.



- Please be sure your child will be able to wear their jacket over their costume for outside playtime.
- Please be sure that the costume is age-appropriate and school-appropriate (not gory or scary).
- Please leave hand-held accessories at home (no weapons, brooms, wands, etc.)
- If the costume includes a mask, students may bring it to show the class but it will not be possible for them to wear it.
- To help prevent hurt feelings and disappointment, please have a discussion with your child about taking responsibility for their own costume and about respecting other children's costumes.
- Children should also take extra care while playing outside at lunch and recess.
- After Halloween, it is always nice if you pay close attention during the following few days to make sure the sandwich-made-with-love is not swimming in a lunch box filled with, if not entirely replaced by, chocolates and candies.



Understanding the Importance of the Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA)

The Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) is a province-wide assessment that provides a snapshot of how well students in British Columbia are developing core academic skills in Literacy and Numeracy.

This annual assessment, designed by B.C. educators, is an important tool for understanding student learning at the provincial, district, and school levels. It helps identify areas of strength and areas needing improvement, and it supports planning to enhance student achievement across the province.

Key Information for Parents:

- Parent information letters will be sent home prior to the start of the assessment.
- Once completed and marked, student assessments will be sent home for review.
- All students are permitted to use a calculator, dictionary, thesaurus, and receive extra time as needed to support their success.
- The results of the FSA do not count toward your child's term Learning Update (report card).

We encourage all parents and guardians to review the assessment results as they offer valuable insights into your child's foundational learning progress.

If you have any questions or concerns about your child's learning or the assessment process, please contact the school directly. We are here to support your child's educational journey.

Crosswalk Patrollers:

A special thank you to our crosswalk patrollers who will be keeping our students and families safe everyday while they cross the walkway into the school ground.

The patrollers all participated in a half-day training session under the guidance of our District Traffic Officer Trainer. We appreciate the support of all drivers as they work with our patrollers when dropping off and picking up students.

A friendly reminder to all parents that if they see any activities and/or behaviours at the cross walks that you feel are inappropriate please let Mr. Johnson know as soon as possible rather than speaking directly with patrollers.





We are hoping you can help us out by having a discussion with your child regarding **Pokemon cards**, **Hockey card**, **and YuGiOh card for example**, if your child is one who enjoys bringing cards to school. At Watson Road, we recognize the enjoyment and learning that cards can bring to students <u>during lunch and recess</u>. While supervising students during this activity, we encourage them to show, look, play and talk about cards. <u>We discourage trading cards</u> and ask students to wait until after school so their parents can supervise trades to ensure they are fair.



Most of our students are able to follow this request and are able to enjoy social time with cards and friends. In some cases, students choose to not follow the rule of 'no trading cards.' This leads to significant disruptions to the child's learning day. In these cases, staff are called upon to deal with disputes between students, poor trades, and lost cards. Without banning them entirely, we are asking for your help to ensure students are following the guidelines, as well as respecting their teacher's rules about Pokemon cards, so everyone can enjoy the time together with friends and cards, and that they don't disrupt the learning day within their classrooms. **Thank you for your understanding.**

PLASTIC FORKS AND SPOONS:

To reduce the amount of plastic in our landfill and ultimately in our lakes and oceans, we do not provide plastic forks and spoons for students. 
